## The Great Conviction — Thomas' Confession John 20:24–29

## 1. Thomas' frustrated, reactionary spirit

- a. The reason:Guilt he had forsakenand withdrawn from them
- b. The disciples testified; Thomas argued

## 2. Thomas' false picture of Jesus

- a. He was just an earthly deliverer
- b. He was now dead
- c. Result: Persistent doubt for eight days
- 3. Thomas' critical confrontation and confession:
  Jesus appeared,
  and He challenged
  and convicted him
  - a. The confrontation
    - 1) Jesus was aware of Thomas' demands
    - 2) Jesus warned and called for belief
  - b. The strong confession
- 3. Thomas' great lesson for all men:
  The person who believes without seeing will be far more blessedd than those who demand proof

- 24 Now Thomas (called Didymus), one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came.
- 25 So the other disciples told him,
  "We have seen the Lord!"
  But he said to them,
  "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands
  and put my finger where the nails were,
  and put my hand into his side,
  I will not believe it."
- 26 A week later
  his disciples were in the house again,
  and Thomas was with them.
  Though the doors were locked,
  Jesus came and stood among them
  and said, "Peace be with you!"
- 27 Then he said to Thomas,"Put your finger here;see my hands.Reach out your handand put it into my side.Stop doubting and believe."
- 28 Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!"
- 29 Then Jesus told him,
  "Because you have seen me,
  you have believed;
  blessed are those who have not seen
  and yet have believed."
