The Triumphal Entry: Jesus' Claim to be King Luke 19:28–40

(Mt. 21:1-11; Mk. 11:1-11; Jn. 12:12-19)

1	There was the constraint
	to go to Jerusalem:
	To suffer and die

- 28 After Jesus had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.
- 2 There was the deliberate claim to be King
- 29 As he approached Bethphage and Bethany at the hill called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples, saying to them,
- a. He planned a dramatic demonstration in detail
- 30 "Go to the village ahead of you, and as you enter it, you will find a colt tied there, which no one has ever ridden. Untie it and bring it here.
- b. He used the title "the Lord" in laying claim to men's property
- 31 If anyone asks you,

 'Why are you untying it?'

 tell him, 'The Lord needs it.'"
- c. His instructions were carefully followed
- 32 Those who were sent ahead went and found it just as he had told them.
- 33 As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?"
- d. He accepted the recognition of the disciples
- 34 They replied, "The Lord needs it."
- 35 They brought it to Jesus, threw their cloaks on the colt and put Jesus on it.
- 3 There was the people's proclaiming Him to be King
- 36 As he went along, people spread their cloaks on the road.
- 37 When he came near the place where the road goes down the Mount of Olives, the whole crowd of disciples began joyfully to praise God in loud voices for all the miracles they had seen:

- 4 There was the insistent claim of Jesus;
 He was to be proclaimed King by the people
 - a. Religionists rebuked Him
 - b. Jesus insisted that proclaiming Him King was inevitable

- 38 "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!" "Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!"
- 39 Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to Jesus, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples!"
- 40 "I tell you," he replied,
 "if they keep quiet,
 the stones will cry out."
