## The Seventy Return (Part I): Great Power Luke 10:17–20

- 1 The seventy returned
  - a. With joy
  - b. With great results and a testimony of power
- 2 The Christian labourer has power over Satan
- 3 The Christian labourer has power over all enemies: Perfect security
- 4 The Christian labourer is to rejoice in his salvation, not in his power

- 17 The seventy-two returned with joy and said, "Lord, even the demons submit to us in your name."
- 18 He replied,"I saw Satan fall like lightning from heaven.
- 19 I have given you authority to trample on snakes and scorpions and to overcome all the power of the enemy; nothing will harm you.
- 20 However, do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven."
