## The Parable of the Growing Seed: The Growth of Believers Mark 04: 26–29

<ol> <li>The parable: Describes the kingdom</li> <li>The seed is sown by a man</li> </ol>	26 He also said, "This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man scatters seed on the ground.
3. The growth is not of man	27 Night and day, whether he sleeps or gets up, the seed sprouts and grows, though he does not know how.
4. The growth is sure and constant, but gradual	28 All by itself the soil produces grain – first the stalk, then the head, then the full kernel in the head.
5. The growth is consummated and harvested	29 As soon as the grain is ripe, he puts the sickle to it, because the harvest has come."

## The Parable of the Mustard Seed: The Growth of God's Kingdom Mark 04: 30-32

(Mt. 13:31-32; see Lk. 13:18-19)

	<ul> <li><i>The seed does grow</i></li> <li>a. The reason: It is sown</li> <li>b. The result: It is larger than all the plants</li> <li><i>The birds do nest under its shade</i></li> </ul>	32 Yet when planted, it grows and becomes the largest of all garden plants, with such big branches that the birds of the air can perch in its shade."

## The Use of Parables by Jesus: Why Christ Used Illustrations Mark 04: 33-34

(*Mt.* 13:34-35)

<ol> <li>To illustrate the Word</li> <li>To teach step by step</li> </ol>	33 With many similar parables Jesus spoke the word to them, as much as they could understand.
3. To enforce the lesson in private	<ul><li>34 He did not say anything to them without using a parable.</li><li>But when he was alone with his own disciples, he explained everything.</li></ul>
