The Great Promises of God Given to David (The Davidic Covenant): God's Great Promise of Hope, The Coming Son of David, Christ Himself 2 Samuel 07:01–17

- The burning desire of David to build a temple to God's honour: A heart set on honouring God
 - a. He had been richly blessed
 - b. He wanted to show his gratitude: By building a temple for the Ark (a symbol of God's presence)
 - c. He was encouraged by Nathan the prophet: Because David was so blessed by God
- 2. The blessings and promises of God during David's lifetime: A picture of God's blessings
 - a. God's correction of Nathan: Reversed his counsel
 - b. God's instructions to David: He was not the one who was to build the temple
 - 1) God had never had a house built for His presence: His dwelling place had always been a lent (the Tabernacle)
 - 2) God had never complained nor asked His shepherds (leaders) to build Him a temple

- 1 After the king was settled in his palace and the LORD had given him rest from all his enemies around him,
- 2 he said to Nathan the prophet,"Here I am, living in a house of cedar,while the ark of God remains in a tent."
- 3 Nathan replied to the king, "Whatever you have in mind, go ahead and do it, for the LORD is with you."
- 4 But that night the word of the LORD came to Nathan, saying:
- 5 "Go and tell my servant David,
 'This is what the LORD says:
 Are you the one to build me
 a house to dwell in?
- 6 I have not dwelt in a house from the day I brought the Israelites up out of Egypt to this day.I have been moving from place to place with a tent as my dwelling.
- Wherever I have moved with all the Israelites, did I ever say to any of their rulers whom I commanded to shepherd my people Israel, "Why have you not built me a house of cedar?"

- c. God's blessings and promises to David
- First, an astounding rise to royalty and power: From a shepherd to king over "My people"
- 2) Second, God's presence and guidance
- 3) Third, God's power to conquer all enemies
- 4) Fourth, the gift of a great, honourable name
- 5) Fifth, the promised land for Israel, God's people
- A settled, permanent home
- A peaceful, undisturbed home
- A home free from the wicked and oppressive
- 6) Sixth, a life of rest (militarily and spiritually)
- 3. The blessings and promises of God to be fulfilled after David's death:
 Promises predicting and pointing to both Solomon and Christ
 - a. A house, a dynasty for David
 - b. A seed, an offspring raised up by God Himself, Gen 15:5; Mat 1:1; Acts 2:30; 13:23
 - c. A kingdom established by God Himself, Luke 1:31-32
 - d. A spiritual house of worship, Zec 6:12-13; John 2:19-21
 - e. An eternal throne or kingdom, 1 Chr 22:6-10; Mat l9:28-29; Luke 22:29-30; John l8:36

- 8 "Now then, tell my servant David,
 'This is what the LORD Almighty says:
 I took you from the pasture,
 from tending the flock,
 and appointed you ruler
 over my people Israel.
- 9 I have been with you wherever you have gone, and I have cut off all your enemies from before you.
 Now I will make your name great, like the names of the greatest men on earth.
- 10 And I will provide a place
 for my people Israel and will plant them
 so that they can have a home of their own
 and no longer be disturbed.
 Wicked people will not oppress them anymore,
 as they did at the beginning
- I and have done ever since the time
 I appointed leaders over my people Israel.
 I will also give you rest
 from all your enemies."
 'The LORD declares to you
 that the LORD himself will establish
 a house for you:
- 12 When your days are over and you rest with your ancestors, I will raise up your offspring to succeed you, your own flesh and blood, and I will establish his kingdom.
- 13 He is the one who will build a house for my Name, and I will establish the throne of his kingdom forever.

- f. A descendant who would be the Son of God, Isa 9:6; Mark 1:1; Luke 1:31-32; John 20:31; Heb 1:5
- g. A son who would be punished for sin, 1 Kng 11:1-13; Rom 5:8; Heb 5:8-9; 1 Pet 2:24
- 1) Inflicted by men, Acts 2:22-23
- 2) God's mercy and love for His Son would be unfailing, Mat 12:18; 17:5; Mark 1:11; Eph 1:6; Col 1:13; Heb 5:5
- h. The conclusion
- 1) The promise of an eternal throne and kingdom repeated, Isa 11:1-9; Jer 23:5; Zec 3:8
- The revelation of God was reported to David word for word

- 14 I will be his father,and he will be my son.When he does wrong,I will punish him with a rod wielded by men,with floggings inflicted by human hands.
- 15 But my love will never be taken away from him, as I took it away from Saul, whom I removed from before you.
- 16 Your house and your kingdom will endure forever before me; your throne will be established forever."
- 17 Nathan reported to David all the words of this entire revelation.
